Upcoming Event Calendar:

We have a lot of good things coming up for you in 2008.

January 8th: <u>Large branch pruning and major redesign</u>. Winter is the right time for such work on apples and pines, and John M will bring in a variety of trees to explain their histories and demonstrate the process of redesign on established bonsai. Please consider bringing in a tree of your own, to bring up front and encourage our group to brainstorm design alternatives.

February 12th: <u>Repotting forest plantings</u>. This can be complicated work, and Fred will bring in two of his own bonsai forests, which will require volunteers who want hands-on training in the process of removing, root-pruning, and repotting before our live audience.

March 11th: a. <u>Selecting the 3 trees to represent GSBS at the MABS symposium</u>; please begin preparing your best material to be submitted before our membership. b. <u>Hands-on workshop</u> on one of the following topics, depending on availability of materials: (a) soils and soil-making; (b) fertilizers and fertilizer-making; (c) design and styling of literati bonsai. We will provide an update as things develop.

April 8th: <u>Guest lecturer Mr. Min Hsuan Lo</u> (note change of date, back to our 'usual' second Tuesday). This internationally-renown Taiwanese bonsai artist will be presenting a lecture-demonstration later that week at the Mid-Atlantic Bonsai Symposium in upstate New York. Topic for our meeting to be determined; Mr. Lo is well-known for his work with junipers, but this may be a good opportunity to have a critiquing session with your trees.

May 15th (Thursday): <u>Guest lecturer Jim Barrett</u>. Perhaps best known for his pottery, Jim is also an outstanding bonsai artist in his own right. Topic to be determined.

First Saturday in June: <u>Annual GSBS Club Open House</u>. This takes place in the big hall upstairs of our regular meeting room, and is open to the public from 10:00 am until 3:00 pm; club members begin setting up at 9:00 am. We will present our annual display of club members' trees, as well as lecture-demonstrations, raffling demo trees, and engaging our visitors with conversation and answering their bonsai questions.

January Plant Care Tips:

So far, so good. Hopefully, all trees are doing well.

Not much going on at this time of the year. All of our plants have gone into their dormant period. Except perhaps, for those of us with tropicals, we're not doing any styling, pruning or wiring at this point.

Outdoor trees should not need watering, but may need to be protected from excessive rain. A blanket of snow will do no harm to hardy trees in the open, but if a quick thaw occurs, it could be like having a week's worth of rain in a day. So if you have a large blanket of snow and expect a thaw, it's wise to remove most of the snow before the temperature warms up.

Check for pests during your weekly water check. Conifers can be destroyed by aphids or spider mites in a matter of a couple of weeks. Also, allow your lower trunks to get some air during any mild spells to prevent them being over moist. (move the mulch around and leave the trees exposed during a warm day)

Look over your tools, pots and other supplies. A good cleaning might be required. Review your styling notes, and photos. Plan for the up-coming spring while the time is available. You could also prepare your soil supply for repotting and order in any supplies that you find to be in short supply.
