This workshop will take place in our usual meeting room at the Frelinghuysen Arboretum.




#### The Colors of Winter

Some of you newbies out there (and even some of us old-timers) may be curious about the muted foliage colors on your hardy evergreen bonsai this winter. What were vivid, rich greens in July have turned to dull bronze or reddish-green by January.

There is no reason to panic—junipers, yews, and arborvitae usually display distinct color shifts during the cold months.

My yews and arborvitae have gone from bright, cheerful green (color swatch A) to a rather forlorn, greenish-dusty-brownish-mossy gray (color swatch B), but that's normal for the time of year. What you want is for the color to return to Type A as the new buds begin to swell with the onset of warm weather and longer day length. If the color is not back by June, you may have a problem. Until then, relax!



Similarly, my Eastern Red Cedars (a species of juniper) have all gone a sort of coppery red-green by now, but once again they should brighten up come April.



The good thing is, the springtime color change is a great indication of the health of your evergreen bonsai, and a trustworthy signal that the growing season has commenced and that you can safely engage in such activities as repotting and so forth.

## Plant Care Tips for February - A lot like January!

The weather continues weirdly—a few days in the 50s and even 60s, followed by a return to the 20s and 30s. Continue to protect your bonsai from abrupt fluctuations in temperature. As mentioned last month, if you keep your collection in a shed or unheated garage, continue to be watchful of warm spells—a few days in the 50s could have your bonsai breaking bud, only to have them freeze in the next (inevitable) cold snap!

February remains a good time to assess the design of your deciduous trees and wire your evergreen trees, to plan your repotting schedule, mix or purchase bonsai soil, clean up and sharpen your tools, read some good books and periodicals, and travel the countryside looking for suitable material from the field.

Watering, when needed, should be limited to keeping the soil slightly moist. Remember, leafless trees need less water, but don't allow the soil to dry out completely! This holds true throughout the winter months.

Remember, winter protection is chiefly concerned with: (a) preventing the soil from repeatedly freezing and thawing; (b) preventing wind from dehydrating the upper portion of the plant; and (c) preventing the soil from drying out completely. You may also have to concern yourself with rodents that sometimes feed on the bark of dormant trees. Wiring may be performed on most conifers during the winter months, but deciduous trees are often too brittle to survive branch-bending, so postpone wiring on leafy trees until spring. [JM]

Now is a good time to begin putting together your bonsai compost. A suggested combination would be 1/3 peat, 1/3 garden compost, 1/3 sand or grit, and a slow-release fertilizer (about a handful per 5 gallons). Towards the end of the month, if there are any brief mild spells, it is time to repot and wire those deciduous trees. It is also possible to lift trees from the ground and do some undercutting. Leave evergreens until later. Branch pruning of deciduous and evergreen trees can be done (except Japanese maples and pines). Any major redesign and reshaping of trees can be done now. Pines and evergreens can be grafted now. [DY]

## Save and Bring In Your Discarded Copper Bonsai Wire

Please remember to save and bring in those wire clippings. It helps if you cut your wire into short (3-6 inch) lengths, as it packs more easily for transport and sale. About once a year we bring them to a scrap metal dealer and swap them for cash. It's usually about enough to equal one or two paid memberships, so it really does help keep the GSBS afloat.
