Like most of our recent outdoor meetings, most of the time was spent hobnobbing and admiring the various bonsai brought to the meeting, in addition to marveling at Mark and Sheila's exquisite garden. Mark and Sheila have done a lot of "thinning" of the herbaceous ranks this spring, and had many plants to give away—hostas, ferns, you name it—and most of them found eager and grateful new owners.

In between all the socializing, club member **Fred Aufschläger** demonstrated the technique of **grafting** young shoots to older branches—this time on a collected Eastern Redcedar (*Juniperus virginiana*) from John Michalski's collection, that has simply refused to "back-bud" and needs this technique in order to produce more foliage closer to the main trunk. We grafted three different branches, and I will keep you updated as things (hopefully) progress.

Fred's Grafting Procedure



The juniper in need of closer foliage pads.

Plant Care Tips for May

By May most deciduous trees have come into leaf and new candles on pines have sprouted. Watering should now routinely be done once a day. Cuttings of evergreens may still be taken. Air-layering of deciduous and evergreens can be continued. Pinch back long shoots of deciduous trees as sudden frosts can damage the young leaves. [DY]

You can still repot or dig trees in May if you're careful. Begin your feeding, pinching, pruning schedules in earnest. It's growing season, folks! Oddly, in many ways this is easier than the worrying months of winter.

As for my own bonsai collection, I've been bud-pinching the **bush honeysuckles** for weeks already, and am certainly on at least the fifth or sixth pinching session by now—I nip out the newest pair of leaves as soon as they are big enough for my pudgy fingers to pick them off. My **spruce**, **yew**, **and hemlock** have all extended their first set of spring buds (a few weeks back, actually), which I pinched back to half or less of their initial length. And my **beech** bonsai had their buds nipped back leaving only the first two leaves, as soon as the buds extended enough for me to separate one baby leaf from the next.

This week, I am about to go into Round Two of leaf-pruning my **plum** and **Amur maple** bonsai, which I do after the new shoots have lengthened and the leaves hardened off somewhat. In my experience, bud-pinching these species (as we do successfully with Japanese maples) results in weakened branches that sometimes die back altogether, so I always let them extend and enjoy themselves for a couple of weeks before cutting back to the first or second set of leaves on each green stem. Repeat – fertilizers, soil mixes, repotting: Ask 20 bonsai practitioners about any of these topics and you are liable to receive 20 different answers. Nowadays, with so many genuine bonsai masters making their expertise available via **YouTube**, you can get all kinds of good advice from the people with the most experience, and I encourage you to do so.

As for me, I tend to let individual trees remain in the same pot until I sense that the water is no longer draining well during watering—unless there is an obvious health issue that might require a change of soil mix, or checking on possible root damage. My soil mixes have evolved quite a bit over the past 30 years—frankly, mainly in the direction of pre-packaged professional mixes, or potting mixes fabricated to order by people who have all the right ingredients. In short, I go where the pro's go.

As to fertilizing, for the past several years I've placed my faith in pelleted surface fertilizer (the brand I use is **Osmocote**) that releases small amounts of the good stuff every time you water, or every time it rains. (The products you mix in the watering can work fine, too, except that they will leach out when it rains.) I have fortified all my bonsai with this product **this weekend**, as the buds are expanding and leaves are extending. The only exception I make is for refined trees for which I do not wish to encourage excessive growth. For those trees, I hold off on fertilizer until after the first set of leaves has set and hardened off. Everything else gets the full treatment. [JM]

Save Your Discarded Copper Bonsai Wire

Please remember to save and bring in those wire clippings. It helps if you cut your wire into short (3-6 inch) lengths, as it packs more easily for transport and sale. About once a year we bring them to a scrap metal dealer and swap them for cash. It's usually about enough to equal one or two paid memberships, so it really does help keep the GSBS afloat.
