

#### **November Highlights:**

Our November meeting was held on the 3rd Tuesday due to two Arboretum holidays: Election Day and Veteran's Day. Our featured speaker was our own Martin Schmalenberg who spoke in depth and at length about the Literati "movement" in China and in particular, its influence on the Bunjin style of Bonsai. These guys were the Intellectuals/Artists/Poets of their day and were both politically connected and wealthy enough to be able to maintain their chosen lifestyle. They "did their own thing", rejecting the influence of so-called "trained artists". They were very much into "do what you feel" rather than "do it this way"...

Marty covered the history of the literati and shed considerable light on their philosophy and style using lecture and a slide presentation. Much of their art work was more suggestive of nature rather than being an acurate depiction of it. This makes their art very alluring and their influence on the Japanese was profound.

Several members brought "pre-literati" material which Marty reviewed, critiqued and worked on to various extents as the meeting time allowed. Below are just a few of the trees that were brought in. #### December plant care:

The leaves of Autumn have now finally fallen and the fine twigs of deciduous specimens are nicely revealed. Conifers will sparkle with frost in the early mornings. You can appreciate the time you spent in the growing season caring for your trees. Your good work is evident.

Hardy species can be dug and potted into large containers or growing beds. Large, fully hardy deciduous bonsai can be repotted now, but only if roots can be protected from hard frost for the entire winter ahead.

Only rough pruning of raw material should be attempted now. Even well sealed wounds may die back around the edges if winter is severe enough. And, as usual, the Farmer's Almanac cannot be totally trusted to be right! Resist the temptation to begin any wiring. It will likely encourage die-back and lead to disappointment.

Water only when necessary, but check your trees regularly. Wind can dry out our plants as much as summer sun. Our trees are susceptible to over-watering, especially during rainy periods.

Be vigilant about removing debris that can harbor pests. Dead annual moss should be cleaned away. Check for scale, galls, etc and treat accordingly. Inspect conifers for signs of spider mite. Spray trees with fungicides and/or insecticides on dry, sunny days. Take hardwood cuttings and plant hard-shelled seeds.

Lacking a greenhouse, a wooden frame covered with clear plastic sheeting is an acceptable substitute. Keep your tender-hardy trees within this coldframe for protection from severe weather conditions.
