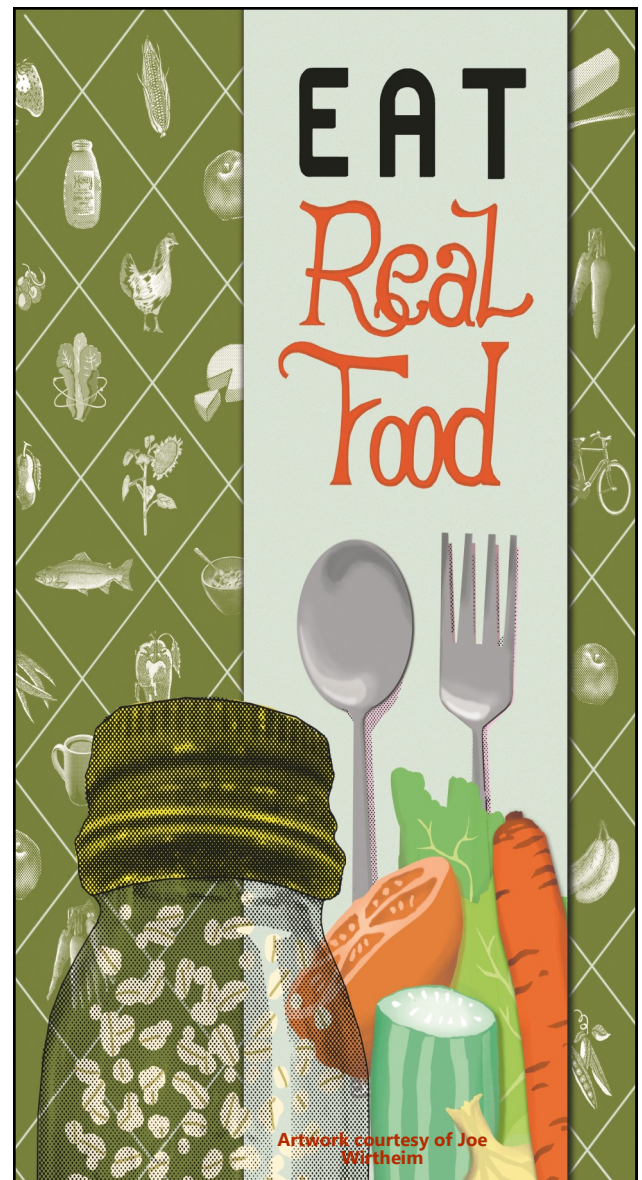

Keynote speaker

The Art of the Seed

Ken Greene, Hudson Valley Seed Company

In this uplifting and inspiring talk, learn the story and the history of seeds through beautiful art work. Seeds tell a story and there is a significant intersect between art and agriculture. Hudson Valley Seed Company commissions artists to produce their famous seed art packs because of their belief that gardens inspire art and art inspires gardens. If you have ever seen antique seed catalogs, or paintings of Monet's beloved garden at Giverny, or the 16th Century artist Archimboldo's paintings that hang in the Louvre, you get it! Seeds are not just commodities and as gardeners that resonates. They come with stories and the artwork changes the way people feel about what they see. Ken will speak about open-pollinated, hybrid and heirloom seeds and also about the work he is doing with SeedShed, his non-profit seed justice initiative.

Ask the Experts: Understanding Disease Management in Community Gardens

The IPM Team scouts and monitors several community gardens in Morris County for pests and diseases on a biweekly basis. They produce reports based on their findings with photos of the problem as well as solutions. They have been doing this important work for 3 years now and have compiled a timeline of when issues were observed so that now we can anticipate and actively look for certain problems. Learn how they do their work, how COVID affected them in the 2020 season and how you can have access to their remarkable work.

Starting Seeds Indoors: When and How

There is such joy and excitement watching as seedlings emerge and mature. The biggest excitement, of course, is from either harvesting a food you have grown or seeing a beautiful flower develop. In this presentation, you will learn everything you need to know about starting seeds indoors including seed types, supplies needed, the planting process and caring for seedlings. Vegetable Garden Planning for Community Gardens
