A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

As we have in the past, the Friends of the Frelinghuysen Arboretum dedicated their activities during the past year to the primary goals of our mission statement: Support for the Morris County Park Commission in maintaining and developing the Frelinghuysen Arboretum, and offering the best in horticultural education to all age groups, from toddlers to seniors.

Support for the Arboretum was given in investments of both dollars and time. Volunteers gave over 6000 hours to help with events held here at the Frelinghuysen. Grants approved by the Executive Board of the Friends totaled over \$13,000, which included funding for the hiring of interns and seasonal help, deck furniture for outside areas, seeds and plants for the gardens, professional development, and educational materials for a new program for schoolchildren. Over \$1500 in plant material was donated from the plant sale.

The second and no less important goal of horticultural and environmental education was addressed in the many outstanding programs held during the year. The Community Gardens Conference was booked to capacity for the third year in a row, reaching out to an ever expanding audience. Our classes in vegetable gardening, plant culture, cooking, flower arranging, and all manner of subjects involved in the world of horticulture were attended by many enthusiastic participants. Events for families and children, including Fairy Day, Flower Power Day, Weekend Scavenger Hunts, Sprouts and Matilda's Tea, continue to be popular. Branching Out is now into its forty-first year, with the addition of Junior Master Gardeners for an expanded age group.

The Friends continue to be the sole source of support for the fine Horticultural Library which is the property of the Morris County Park Commission. We also continue to expand the lending library which is available to all members.

We strive to develop and improve the benefits available to our members. The Retail Partners program, offering discounts to members at a variety of services, shops, and dining establishments, has been expanded with the addition of several new partners. The Annual Meeting and New Year's Party offer fine speakers and refreshments at no cost to members. Previews of the Gingerbread Wonderland and Plant Sale are available as well to our members.

As you read this Annual Report, you will be amazed by all that has been accomplished during the past year. I think we can all be justifiably proud of our efforts, thanks to the contributions of so many individuals. First, the Horticultural Education staff of the Morris County Park Commission: Lesley, Gwen, Marge and Cynthia. The time and dedication given by these individuals is astounding and awe-inspiring. The Friends have three loyal and hardworking employees: Karen, Margery and Ellen, who answer phones, maintain our schedules, and keep everything humming. And the members of the Board of the Friends are the driving force which allows our events and programs to be so successful. My job is made so much easier by the unwavering support of all these individuals.

Lastly, a big thank you is in order to all those who support us through membership dues and attendance at programs and events. We all know that the Frelinghuysen Arboretum is a very special place that should be cherished and nurtured not only for those of us here today, but for the enjoyment of future generations as well. Much has been accomplished but much remains to be done. Please continue to give us your valued support!

This has been a banner year for membership. Having a dedicated membership administrative assistant working in the office has helped with the tracking of memberships and insuring the timely distribution of renewal notices. The admin person has been issuing reports about the trends of the membership, and these will become more valuable as we have a year's worth of data to study and use to guide decisions in the future.

This year the committee completed the updating of three renewal letters and tightened the timeline to make the process quicker. We began the process of renewal using email for the first reminder then followed up with three reminder letters via post. Then we added an attractive post card reminder which is mailed about three weeks after their membership lapses. We also created seasonal gift membership cards for giving at the holidays and advertised it on line, in the weekly email blast and sent copies to garden clubs. A library program, "Quelle Livres," was created for members at the Supporting Level and above by Lesley Parness, Superintendent of Horticultural Education and was presented to them. This program will be offered to all Members in the coming months.

We have begun having a membership table at Arboretum programs and events including Mycological Society, Family programs, Gingerbread Wonderland, Mid Autumn Fest, Master Gardener meeting and Community Garden Conference. We have even gone off campus to GCNJ Annual Meeting. We have a large, attractive sign identifying us as representatives from the Arboretum and encouraging people to join the Friends. We talk to potential members, hand out membership brochures and our business card with the website for them to join on line. On occasion we have given out gifts to encourage joining such as daffodil bulbs and character erasers for the children.

We plan to attend garden clubs, affiliate and organizational meetings to present the membership opportunities to their members as they are an idea target audience with an interest in the Arboretum. They may not have thought to become individual or family members.

All the efforts of the committee and the dedicated administrative assistant have paid off nicely since, at this time, we have over 1,000 members. We have many ideas to implement in 2015.

PLANT SALE Chair: Karen Curry

This year's sale, on the first weekend of May, had a member only sale Friday evening and sale open to the public on Saturday and Sunday. The harsh winter reduced the plant availability and therefore we had less plants from some suppliers but the tent looked so inviting to plant lovers that we sold almost every plant we had.

We managed our expenses well this year. A reminder postcard was sent instead of an invitation and we eliminated raffle expenses. Three vendors (Bartlett Tree, TNT Fence and NJ Deer Control) were hired by Ilona Ontscherenki to cover the raffle income loss.

The pre talk, thanks to Sue Acheson, brought in increased funds over last year. With the reduced plant sale expenses we made \$18,416.15.

In true Friends fashion, Sally Hemsen, Sue Acheson, Ilona Ontscherenki, Marla Jackson, Patti Millar, Scott Scarafile, and many others stepped up and made things happen for a successful sale when I was unable to continue as chair. The 244+ volunteers Marge Hulstrunk recruited were willing and very able to get things done. Set up, Plant experts, Master Gardeners, cashiers, even plant sitters all contributed time and energy to make the sale a success.

The membership table was also a success. Volunteers from Home Garden Club of Morristown sold about 20 new memberships pushing Friend's membership above 1,000. They are a team we appreciate.

Thanks to the plant orderers, Robin Morley, Patti Millar, Lesley Parness and Marla Jackson. They did an excellent job with the new format for plant ordering. A special thanks to Ilona for stepping in and doing the Kristoph order when it was in jeopardy. She also put signs all over the property to advertise the plants available at the sale and gave us extra publicity. And thanks to Karen Muccillo for the excellent advertising coverage. I know it brought more people to the sale. Thanks also to Joan Cousineau for the flyer, signs and banners that are so important to the communication with our customers. And thanks to Ollie Acheson for his vigilance with the website, pricing and financials. And Bob Hemsen for overcoming unprecedented challenges to getting the shelves set up. Lesley Parness and the MCPC staff were invaluable, as always, and Treasurer Bev Highfield did her usual great behind-the scenes job of money counting and expense tracking.

But, this isn't just about the money we make. The plant sale fund raiser is a great opportunity for plant lovers to get together, enjoy the spring and contribute to the Arboretum and its mission.

The Friends should all be very proud of this accomplishment for the past 19 years.

YOUTH EDUCATION 2013 - 2014

Youth Education programs remain very popular at the Frelinghuysen Arboretum, attracting many young people, visitors and new members.

Many of the young visitors come on school field trips during spring and fall. Our volunteers and staff conducted 74 workshops and introduced children to seed and seedling planting and exposing them to the wonder of plants and the beauty of the Arboretum. In addition, there were six groups that came during the summer.

"Branching Out!" is a very popular gardening program where children ages 5 to 13 learn to cultivate soil, plant flowers and vegetables, tend their plots and harvest their crops. The children also do some cooking and nature related crafts. Last summer, 60 children participated. This spring there are 64. There is now a new section for Middle School students where 13 are participating. Fifteen young volunteers, mostly former "Branching Out!" participants help with the program.

Scout groups came for after school activities to earn their various badges. Eight groups consisting of 325 scouts came for workshops. In addition, 1000 Girl Scouts came for four scouts-only evenings to see the Gingerbread Exhibit and take part in a craft project. Ten adult and youth volunteers helped with this program.

The Friends continue to support the Junior Master Gardener Program. Now in its ninth year, the program has eight young people. They again participated in this year's Friends Plant Sale, where they sold many varieties of heirloom tomato seedlings which they grew from seed. The proceeds were donated to charity.

The Garden Sprouts Program for children ages 3 to 5 continues. Workshops are held on Mondays and feature outdoor garden walks, crafts and other learning activities to introduce children to the world of plants and nature. Three volunteers and one staff member conducted 25 classes for 175 children.
