Teacher, writer, lecturer, plant explorer. Consultant, nurseryman, naturalist, gardener. Dan Hinkley has achieved the pinnacle of success in all these areas and is recognized worldwide as a giant in the field of horticulture.

Continuing a long tradition of presentations by world-renowned horticultural experts, the Friends of the Frelinghuysen Arboretum are proud to host Dan Hinkley at the Haggerty Education Center. As creator of the famed Heronswood Garden and Nursery near Seattle, Hinkley has explored remote corners of the globe in search of new plants to expand the ever-growing offerings in his, and ultimately our own gardens. A visit to Heronswood, Hinkley's first garden, was a never to be forgotten experience of strolling through one beautiful garden room after another. The gardens were creative, environmentally sensitive and botanically stunning, drawing visitors from around the world.

Hinkley will share with us the joys and tribulations of creating his current garden, Windcliff. Heronswood was primarily a woodland shade garden and the new garden, Windcliff is located on yes, a windy cliff. New plants, a different site, but with the same unequalled sense of design coupled with stunning views and intimate pathways. This is a plantsman's garden but contemporary and harmonious in design, with art and handicrafts complementing the stunning horticultural displays.

Benjamin Blackburn Scholarship Lecture special events

Since 1979, the Friends of The Frelinghuysen Arboretum have supported horticultural education through a scholarship named for Dr. Benjamin Blackburn. This year's Benjamin Blackburn Lecture speaker is Joan Maloof. Joan's lecture, **Speaking for the Trees: The Importance of Old-Growth Forests** is not only timely but fascinating and incredibly important. Joan is Professor Emeritus at Salisbury University and founded the Old-Growth Forest Network to preserve, protect and promote the country's few remaining stands of old-growth forest. She spends her time lecturing, writing, visiting forests, assisting private landowners, and supporting local groups trying to protect community forests from development.

Dr. Blackburn was a professor of Botany at Drew University. His involvement with the Morris County Park Commission began with his friendship with Henry and Robert Tubbs, whose property, Willowwood, eventually became the Willowwood Arboretum. Dr. Blackburn published many articles and wrote a number of books on gardening as well as being the host of a very popular radio gardening program. He generously shared his vast knowledge and deep love for horticulture with many staff members in the Horticulture Division and with his countless fans – members of the Friends of The Frelinghuysen Arboretum and area garden clubs.

Admission fees support the scholarship that is offered to students in the Landscape and Horticultural Technology Program at County College of Morris. This scholarship allows interested students the opportunity to explore the different horticultural, environmental, and design studies offered through the accredited CCM programs. The increased knowledge the students acquire in the classroom and through hands-on programs at CCM will benefit them as they enter their chosen field in horticulture and landscape design. A book signing and light refreshments follow the talk.

Keynote Address: Creating Abundance: The Community Gardening Experience by Barbara Pleasant, Author

Top Ten Community Garden Pests and Diseases of 2018 Peter Nitzsche, Agricultural and Resource Mamt Agent **Rutgers Cooperative Extension of Morris County**

Community gardens across New Jersey were surveyed to determine the most common pests and diseases found this past growing season. Horticultural Therapy and the Community Garden Ann Fahey, Assistant Superintendent of Horticultural Education Morris County Park Commission

Community Gardens are a great place to incorporate horticultural therapy. Nick Storrs has been working in and around gardens for the past decade. He worked on market farms outside of Burlington, VT before coming to New York City. He raises over 200 varieties of fruits and vegetables while teaching others about the importance of good food and engaging students of all ages in our food system.
