

Bruce Crawford

Since 1980, the Friends of The Frelinghuysen Arboretum have annually given recognition to an individual, several individuals or an organization that has made a significant impact on the world of horticulture. The 2019 Annual Award goes to Bruce Crawford.

Bruce Crawford was born to be a plantsman. He was raised by parents who enjoyed both creating and visiting gardens, and has treasured memories of those visits. Destiny decreed that he start his own landscape design business, Garden Architecture. Bruce also became an adjunct professor of landscape architecture at Rutgers, while Garden Architecture improved the landscapes of New Jersey for twenty-four years.

In 2005, Bruce became Director of Rutgers Gardens. This new challenge allowed him to combine his love of plants, teaching, and the development of a public garden for the enjoyment of all. He immediately initiated the creation of a master plan for the garden's future, assured an emphasis on education for both Rutgers students and the public, and increased community involvement. New garden areas, a re-design of existing ones, increased volunteer participation and exciting new programs were all part of his vision for the improvement of Rutgers Gardens.

The broader gardening world is most grateful to Bruce for the countless hours he has spent introducing others to the joy of plants. Master Gardeners, students, garden clubs and the general public have benefitted from Bruce's sharing of his prodigious knowledge of all subjects horticultural. His monthly contributions to Gardener News, highlighting a particular plant, as well as his participation as a founding member of Garden State Gardens consortium, have furthered an already extensive public outreach.

We salute Bruce for the time spent acquiring his knowledge and expertise, and his unending sharing of those skills. And we look forward to his continued contributions to the gardening world.





notes from the board





2019 Tree Symposium

Learn about the great tree men and women of America, the many botanical taxa of maples, bringing back the American chestnut and dogwood and hazelnut breeding at Rutgers.

10:00 am – Frank Goodhart Great Tree Men and Women of America

A chronology of those who contributed to horticulture and forest preservation in America from early colonial times to the early twentieth century. Beginning with Bartram followed by Franklin, Jefferson, Michaux, Johnny Appleseed, Morton, Marsh, Thoreau, Muir, Martha Fenimore Cooper, Sargent, Pinchot, Teddy Roosevelt and Mather. Highlights are given for each of their contributions, along with important governmental actions that took place along the way and how they shaped early American forest conservation.

11:00 am – Adam Wheeler *Maples*

Join Adam Wheeler of Connecticut's Broken Arrow Nursery for this informative and educational program that outlines new, unique and exceptional maples. Adam will showcase a broad diversity of options that are well suited for use in Northeast gardens. In addition to ornamental qualities he will highlight important cultural requirements and design considerations.

Adam is the Container Production & Horticulture Manager at Broken Arrow. He is a past recipient of the Young Nursery Professional Award from the New England Nursery Association and is the current Vice President of the North American Maple Society.

1:00 pm – Mike Aucott

Bringing Back the American Chestnut

Mike Aucott will discuss the importance and tragic history of this iconic tree, which once dominated Eastern forests but was virtually wiped out by an imported blight that appeared in the early 1900s. He will describe the challenges and the several varied strategies underway that are part of the effort to help propel the tree over what researchers have called "the cusp of extinction" and to re-establish it in the North American forest. Mike will include a simplified description of the genetics involved in developing a blight-resistant chestnut that can thrive in the forest environment. He will also discuss the importance of local efforts to find surviving American chestnuts, and offer keys to help identify this tree.

Mike Aucott holds a Ph.D. in Environmental Science from Rutgers University. He retired from his position as research scientist for the NJ Department of Environmental Protection in 2012, and now teaches chemistry at the College of New Jersey. He also does consulting work in energy issues, air pollution and climate change, and is a member of the American Chestnut Foundation. Mike has established a research orchard of 800 hybrid chestnut trees in Northern Pennsylvania.

2:00 pm Tom Molnar

Dogwood & Hazelnut Breeding at Rutgers

Tom will discuss his current work including germplasm exploration, collection, and evaluation. A major aspect of his current research is developing and characterizing genetic resistance to eastern filbert blight, a fungal disease which is the primary limiting factor of hazelnut production in eastern North America. Breeding objectives in both woody ornamentals and hazelnuts emphasize selection for high levels of disease and pest resistance and cold hardiness.

Thomas Molnar received his PhD from Rutgers University in 2006. He is currently an Associate Professor in the Plant Biology Department of the Rutgers University School of Environmental and Biological Sciences (New Brunswick, New Jersey, USA). His research program concentrates on the genetic improvement and study of hazelnuts (Corylus) and large-bracted dogwoods (Cornus).

Recipe for Fall Entertaining Celeriac and Apple Soup

Ingredients:

1/4 cup (1/2 stick) unsalted butter

11/4 pound celeriac (celery root) peeled cut into ½-inch cubes (about 4 cups)

2 medium granny smith apples, peeled and cored and cut into ½-inch cubes (about 3 cups)

1 large onion, chopped

4 cups (or more) chicken broth

½ cup chopped chives

½ cup grapeseed oil

Pinch of salt

Directions:

Melt the butter in a heavy soup pot over medium heat. Add the celeriac, apples, and onion. Saute until the apples and celeriac are translucent but not brown, about 15 minutes. Add the broth. Cover and bring to simmer. Reduce the heat to medium-low and simmer covered until celery root and apples are soft, stirring occasionally, about 25 minutes. Remove from heat and cool slightly.

Working in batches, puree the soup in a blender until smooth. Take care to cover the top of the blender with a dishtowel while holding down the lid and only fill the blender ½ way. The steam from the soup can make the top pop off if filled too high. Add more broth if the soup seems too thick. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Puree chives, grapeseed oil, and pinch of salt in the blender until smooth. Both the soup and the chive oil can be made ahead. Rewarm the

soup and drizzle with the chive oil right before serving.



The 2019 Arbor Day Awards

Judy Snow and Russell Gatzke are the recipients of the 2019 Arbor Day Award.

We bonor them with the planting of a tree at the Frelingbuysen Arboretum, and with the profound thanks of not only members of the Friends, but all those who enjoy visiting the Arboretum.

Judy Snow became President of the Friends in June of 2016, having previously served on the Board for several years as Library Chair. She brought to the position her noteworthy work experience at Rutgers and her extensive horticultural knowledge. But of most value to the Friends were Judy's organizational skills, her attention to detail, and her firm sense of commitment to any job she took on.

The onset of Judy's term of office coincided with a re-focus by the Morris County Park Commission in its relationship with the Friends. As a result of retirements by long-time staff support and departure of other key staff members, assignments previously covered by those people now fell to the Friends Board. Judy stepped in to cover these shortfalls, at the same time endeavoring to smooth relations with the Park Commission. Her workload often meant she was spending more than twenty hours per week on Friends' activities, seeking to continue to deliver the programs and services that the members have come to appreciate. That she accomplished this with quiet determination and minimal disruption to operations is a testament to her dedication and skills. Indeed, it is fair to say that if the Friends had not had Judy at the helm during these difficult times, the survival of the organization would have been imperiled. We are lucky that Judy has elected to remain as an officer during a time of continued transition for the Friends, and look forward to what we know will be further contributions.

Changes to the Program Registration Process
