Dear Friends,

In May of 1971 The Frelinghuysen Arboretum was dedicated in a formal ceremony hosted by the Morris County Park Commission (MCPC). Gifted by Matilda E. Frelinghuysen, daughter of George Griswold Frelinghuysen and Sarah Ballantine, the mansion was to be used as MCPC headquarters and the grounds for public enjoyment and education.

Not long after, in 1972, a group of eight visionary community members saw that there was need for advocacy and support for the arboretum and joined forces to create the Friends of The George Griswold Frelinghuysen Arboretum (Friends). Among their first efforts was the development of educational programming and the creation of a newsletter, the Arboretum Leaves, both of which were greatly successful in capturing the attention of the public. Both continue to be important to the organization's mission today.

Over the years the Friends, now a 501c(3) nonprofit corporation, earmarked programming and fundraising monies for the development of The Frelinghuysen Arboretum's gardens, infrastructure, staff and, as well, to support projects at The Tourne, Willowwood Arboretum, and Bamboo Brook Outdoor Education Center. I know, I know! Forty-eight years of resolute roll-up-your-sleeves hard work by volunteer trustees and friends is a testament not only to what a worthy cause the Frelinghuysen Arboretum is but also to the caliber of people who champion the Friends' initiatives, both yesterday and today. Mathilda would be so proud to see what a joy her former Whippany Farm is to so many visitors seeking passive recreation and horticultural education.

Those trustees who came before me, pillars of business and grand dames of Morris County society, serve to inspire me to continue in their footsteps and to bring along those who become part of the Friends of the Frelinghuysen Arboretum's Board of Trustees today. We are:

Passalong Plants by Margery Ennist

I was introduced to the concept of passalong plants quite a few years ago via a book written by Steve Bender and Felder Rushing entitled, curiously enough, *Passalong Plants*. In a nutshell, the book describes a behavior practiced in the southern states of sharing unusual and interesting plants that may no longer be available commercially, thus the passalong moniker.

Over the years, I have received many plants of all kinds from friends and family, not necessarily unusual, but nevertheless given by gardeners wanting to share the wealth. I've received beautiful yellow and lavender Irises, a Hellebore, an unusually dark pink Hydrangea with blue in the center of the flower, Christmas Ferns, a Prickly Pear Cactus, old fashioned Feverfew and Money Plant, Columbines and Hyacinths.

The wonderful thing about these passalong plants is that the memory of the giver surfaces every spring as the weather warms up and the plants break ground. When I see the first shoots of Feverfew, Money Plant, Columbine and Christmas ferns, I think of my Mom, who loved to garden and share her plants and knowledge. She's been gone for several years now, but her plants live on in my garden and in my heart.

The dark pink Hydrangea is a gift from a neighbor who moved away. Before leaving, she invited me to choose a plant from her garden as a parting gift. The Hydrangea was not in bloom at the time, but every year when the flowers open, I have fond memories of Jean for the lovely plant she bequeathed me. We lost touch, but her gift is still giving in my garden.

The Prickly Pear Cactus was a present from an ex-sister-in-law. Although she is no longer in the family, we keep in touch and she knew I would love to have a piece of the Cactus. It has flourished in my garden next to a stone wall for several years now and each year it produces more lovely yellow flowers than the year before. I thank Linda mentally and sometimes via text message for her gift.

The yellow and lavender Irises, Hellebore, Hyacinths, etc. were all given by dear friends and fellow gardeners, all reminders of cherished friendships and a love of gardening. Gardening has always been a very therapeutic endeavor for me and a reminder to be grateful for gardening friends and the plants they have gifted me with.

Even though, at this writing, the Frelinghuysen Arboretum and its library are closed up tight, the Garden Lovers book club is still making plans for this year. The Club, which is a benefit for members of the Friends, meets on the first Monday of the month. For our March meeting we discussed *"The Overstory"* by Richard Powers. It is a Pulitzer prize winning book about the frustrations and perils of being a "tree hugger" and well worth your time.

Our plans for this year are branching out from garden books. Those programs will include the following subjects: Women Raising Birds, Invasives: A New Look and the novels of Beverley Nichols (choose one from his 12 garden books). We will also be reading *"Second Nature"* by Michael Pollan and *"Gardens of the Evening Mist"* by Tan Twan Eng.

We currently have scheduled author Marta McDowell to discuss her book *"Emily Dickinson's Gardening Life"* on June 1st. We will keep club members posted on dates of the programs as soon as the parks reopen.

The club also has other activities such as tours of members' gardens, plant exchanges, slide programs from members or guest speakers and an annual luncheon to share our favorite dishes.

The passing of Peter Frelinghuysen resulted in a large donation of books from his library. They are beautiful books and we are in the process of accessioning them into the library. They include books on clematis, orchids, bulbs, bark and many on gardens of the world that he visited. Our members are encouraged to use the library and, in fact, for the August meeting each member will checkout a book from the library to share with the group.

Members of the Friends may borrow books from the library. The process is detailed on the website arboretumfriends.org. First look under "Resources tab", then "From the Library", and then "On-line Catalog". This enables you to review the books available once the park re-opens.

- Books by Doug Tallamy *(Bringing Nature Home; Nature's Best Hope)* sound the call for all gardeners to rethink how their plantings can benefit our shrinking wildlife population.

When the rains come and the aching muscles need a rest, big beautiful picture books are in order. Some good choices:

- *Gardens of the Garden State* by Nancy Berner and Susan Lowry
- *Nature into Art: The Gardens of Wave Hill* by Thomas Christopher
- *Chasing Eden: Design Inspiration from the Gardens of Hortulus Farm* by Jack Staub and Renny Reynolds

Besides offering gorgeous photos, all feature gardens that can be visited in an easy day trip from our area.

Cookbook Review

Many of us have taken to baking bread while we are staying home protecting ourselves and our loved ones from this horrible virus.

My new favorite cookbook is Poilâne: The Secrets of the World-Famous Bread Bakery by Apollonia Poilâne.

Poilâne is the world-renowned bakery in Paris on the rue Cherche-Midi in a building that was a convent during the French Revolution. I will never forget the first time I visited this amazing place. I was literally awestruck. I remember standing outside just staring at the window display before I gathered up the nerve to walk in. I owned my own bakery at the time and I just couldn't believe what I was seeing. Huge, dark loaves of the most beautiful bread I'd ever seen, lovely individual apple tarts that became a staple at my bakery and the croissants, wow! It's not an understatement to say that visit changed my life. Poilâne began in 1932 by the author's grandfather, Pierre. Her father, Lionel, took over the bakery in the 70's and Apollonia began apprenticing there when she was a teenager. Today there are more than 200 bakers producing more than 5000 loaves a day without compromising the incredible craftsmanship! The book itself is a work of art and the recipes are written for the home baker with notes and sources on ingredients. It's not just about the bread either. There are recipes for tarts, jams, chocolates, soups, salads and main course dishes. And yes the apple tart recipe is in there too! Here's a simple version:

Apple Tart a la Poilâne

- 1 sheet of all butter puff pastry, thawed overnight in the refrigerator.
- 2 tablespoons butter 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 4 apples, tart or sweet depending on what you like

Make a slurry by mixing 1 tablespoon corn starch with 1/4 cup of water. Set aside.

Make an egg wash by beating 1 egg with 1 teaspoon water. Set aside.

Peel, core and slice the apples. Melt the butter in a saute pan. Add the sugar, the cinnamon and the apples. Cook until the apples release some of their juice and are soft. Drain the apples but save the juice. Heat the juice till bubbling and add the slurry, cook for about a minute until thickened. Stir the thickened juice back into the apples and cool. This can be done a day ahead.

Roll out the sheet of puff pastry to measure 12 by 8 inches and cut into large or small squares. Place a scoop of the apples in the center of the square. Brush the edges with the egg wash and bring up each corner to the center of the apples. Pinch to seal. Brush the finished pastries with the egg wash and bake in a 375 degree oven for about 20 minutes or until nicely browned. Dust with confectioner's sugar before serving.


