I miss the joy of hearing your exclamations and ideas after a lecture or gallery opening. I truly miss seeing the latest from our talented Flower Arrangers. I have an all new appreciation for the word hospitality and when finally allowed back to the HEC for events, your presence will not be lost on me, even if in full PPE. HA!

In the meantime, let me share some of the work we've been doing in isolation. Our terrific staff, along with help from Friends' trustees and a team from the Rutgers' Master Gardeners of Morris County adopted the use of the Zoom platform and have been educating ourselves in best practices for bringing you advice and ideas from some of the northeast's finest horticultural educators. This was a long and painful process for many of us and we hope you'll find time to sign up for a class or watch one of our newly created YouTube videos. I am especially fond of Chef Cynthia Triolo's cooking classes. You can also watch a fabulous video of this year's tulip display on the Friends YouTube channel.

Friends also approved four grants targeted for improvements at The Frelinghuysen Arboretum.

Grant #1001. Provided for data conversion of the horticulturally significant Elizabeth D. Kay rare book collection information from Excel to the PastPerfect 5.0 Collections Software Management System. This project centralized the collection into a searchable, adaptable format consistent with best practices standards.

Grant #1002. Monies were allocated to The Frelinghuysen Arboretum for an Annual Flower Display and Cutting Garden plants. We approve these monies every year to enhance the beauty of the arboretum and to create areas of interest for the general public and for educators.

Grant #1003. This grant was awarded for the restoration of the greenhouse at The Frelinghuysen Arboretum. The

intensive cleaning of glass, shades, and screens, along with replacement of rotted ropes is a highly specialized skill requiring scaffolding and a good bit of agility. The Sussex County firm doing the work is proceeding slowly and meticulously in the restoration work. Its completion will allow staff to propagate plants for various educational purposes and also provide a clean and pleasant environment for our Flower Arranger Volunteers to do their creative work when they are allowed back into the building.

Grant #1004. The Friends usually provide funding for an intern each year to help with the never-ending garden work at The Frelinghuysen Arboretum and learn from experienced horticulturists at the same time. With a hiring freeze in effect the horticultural staff was unable to hire an intern so designated funds were transferred to a grant which allows for the retention of one of the Groundsperson positions that would have otherwise been eliminated. All the better for us that she is in the Landscape and Horticulture Program at the County College of Morris.

Oh, and did you know the Annual Tulip Display funded by the Friends of The Frelinghuysen Arboretum did not go unappreciated? With the realization that the gardens would be closed for the foreseeable future a team of MCPC staff and Friends trustees cut several hundred tulips which were then taken to Morris View Senior Care and Morristown Medical Center by Executive Director Dave Helmer himself! Thanks Dave. And thank you to all the frontline workers who continue to work to keep our community safe.

We are delighted to support the Morris County Park Commission, The Frelinghuysen Arboretum, our membership, and our community in these ways.

Recipe for Fall – Curried Butternut Squash Soup

- 2 medium butternut squash
- 1 medium onion, diced
- 2 granny smith apples, peeled, cored and sliced
- 2 tablespoons curry powder
- 1 ½ quarts chicken stock
- Olive oil
- · Salt and pepper

Roast the squash in a 350 degree oven for about 30 minutes or until soft. To roast it, slice in half lengthwise and scoop out the seeds. Place it on a baking pan, cut side down with about ½ cup water. Once cool scoop out the flesh and set aside. This can be done several days in advance.

Saute the onions and apples in olive oil until the onion is transparent and the apples start to release some juice. Add the curry powder and saute for about 2 minutes. Add the squash and the stock and simmer for about 45 minutes. Puree the soup using either an immersion blender or in a regular blender, taking care if the soup is hot. Season with salt and pepper.
