



Passiflora caerulea 'Blue Bahama'

Zone 7

Known for its fragrance and free-flowering, 'Blue Bahama' passionflower is vigorous and resilient. It will die back in winter and come back in spring if planted in a protected area. Great in a container or as an annual. Flowers are nectar-rich and loved by pollinators.

Full sun to light shade

Zone 11

Unique foliage with red stems that trail or climb. Perfect for a hanging basket or trellis. Likes bright indirect light (leaves burn in the sun). Flowers are insignificant.

Water when almost dry.



Clematis 'Alionushka'

Pretty 3 inch nodding pink flowers that bloom from early summer to late autumn. Small in stature (6'), hardy and resistant to wilt. Hard prune in the spring. Allow to scramble through shrubs, roses and perennials or train on an obelisk or trellis. Not suited for fences because of its diminutive mature height. Good shade tolerance.

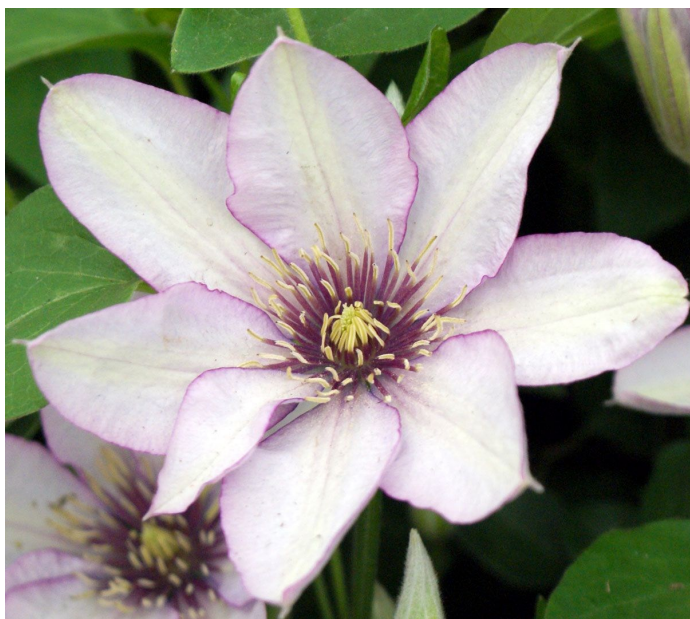
Pruning group 3



Clematis 'Nubia'

Free-flowering (5-6" blooms) and hardy, this exceptionally dark red, compact (to 4-6'), reblooming clematis is excellent for large planters or as an entryway accent. Blooms prolifically from both leaf axils and stems, resulting in flowers from the ground up. An improvement over 'Rebecca'. Deciduous.

Pruning Group 2



Clematis 'Samaritan Jo'

Samaritan Jo produces striking white flowers (5 inches) with bright purple margins along the sepal's edges. It has unique coloring and a very long bloom season. This compact (3-5') vine produces many flowers at a time and will be eye-catching in your patio container or in your perennial border.

Pruning group 3



Clematis viticella 'Betty Corn-ing'

Pale lavender bells of flowers adorn this unique selection from mid-summer into fall. Easy to grow. Blooms profusely all summer with delicate, pendulous blossoms that have a light, sweet fragrance.

Lonicera sempervirens 'Major Wheeler'

Hummingbird favorite: *Lonicera sempervirens* 'Major Wheeler' produces a blanket of tubular, reddish orange to coral flowers from late spring through summer. Later, the vines' red berries attract goldfinches and robins. It's a selection of our native honeysuckle species, *Lonicera sempervirens*, and plants are both carefree and noninvasive.



Lonicera sempervirens 'John Clayton'

The tubular yellow flowers of 'John Clayton' trumpet honeysuckle appear on a compact repeat-blooming form.

This *Lonicera sempervirens* flowers on new growth so avoid pruning until after flowering. Best grown on a support such as an arbor, fence or trellis. Loved by butterflies and other pollinators. *Lonicera sempervirens* 'John Clayton' will produce berries in the fall which are quickly eaten by birds.
